



Romans 13. 11-14;

Brothers and sisters, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

GOSPEL Matthew 24. 36-44;

Jesus spoke to his disciples: 'About that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.'



ADVENT 1 1st. December 2019

LEARNING PEACE

In a time of war, wreckage, and fear aplenty, the prophet Isaiah acts boldly in proclaiming God's destruction of war and construction of peace. This impossibly courageous vision of world reconciliation launches our Season of Advent with two ways we are called to act with God: to break down our warring ways, and to build up our peaceful ways.

Focus scripture

Isaiah 2:1–5 War was a nearly daily part of life in ancient Israel, primarily because of the nation's small size and valuable location. A parcel of land smaller than the U.S. state of Vermont, less than half the size of Tasmania, Australia, or Nova Scotia, Canada, ancient Israel was surrounded on all sides by nations who wanted to own it. Biblical scholars remind us that in the lives of ancient Israelites. there was only "war time" and "preparing-for-war time." In this context, to speak of peace and pacifism (a vigorous debate throughout the Hebrew Scriptures) showed especially audacious faith. In a surprising role-reversal, "the nations" are the eager learners of God's teachings of peace, coming to Zion gladly. Elsewhere, the prophets point to the nations as bad influences, but here, Isaiah admonishes Israel to come and relearn God's ways, following the lead of their enemies turned teachers. Zion, Israel's moral centre and locus of worship, is the place where all the world is willingly, gladly travelling to God's word, in order to learn and practice peace. Isaiah could have painted a picture of a time to come when all the nations will only lay down their weapons and live in peace. But acting out God's peace, it seems, means more than just quitting conflict. Crucial to Israel's prophecy is the more active, participatory nature of peacemaking; all must make the journey to a common table to unlearn war. Martin Luther King Jr.'s wisdom echoes loudly: "Peace is not the absence of conflict, but the presence of justice." Seeking justice means action, and the verbs the nations use in verse three ("go up." "teach." and "walk") illustrate this powerfully. The anticipation, powerful vision, active imagining, total reversal – the action and spirit of Israel's testimony to itself – is echoed and amplified in the other passages the lectionary presents to us this week. In Matthew 24:36–44 we hear, "stay awake! Be ready for reversals, expect the unexpected!"

In Romans 13:11–14, Paul writes with urgency, telling us the time is near. Wake from the various ways we find ourselves numbed, distracted, and asleep, because the glorious new day is not so far away. Further, God wants us in the game, not sleepily awakening to a pile of presents. Our good living and our right action is part of the new vision coming. An interesting tension with the Isaiah image of weapons being smashed into farming tools emerges with Paul's call for believers to "put on the armour of light." In this way, we are reminded how the act of peacemaking requires its own tools. Just as war is learned, so is peace. Like his contemporary Micah (4:1–3), Isaiah proclaims that in God's new world, not only must the weapons be destroyed; they are transformed and repurposed. So it is with our habits, personally and nationally. We cannot simply cease our methods and manners; they must be replaced with new habits, new words, new frames of thought.

Psalm 122 points to the interconnectedness of inner peace and outer peace.

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
When I seek the good of another, I seek the good of myself, and the whole world. To what extent is it possible for us to "see as God sees"? Might we peer into Advent, and glimpse the ways in which our fates are beautifully bound up in one another?

REFLECTION

Holy Spirit of Peace, in a world of war, seen and unseen, in a time of trouble and trauma, we dare say, we dare imagine, we dare confess: Yours is the kingdom, the power, and the glory.

Open your ancient words for us.

Help our souls imagine your new vision for us. Amen.
